When I spoke with him of my concerns about HS2, and the planned closure of the road from Newton Regis to Austrey, he suggested I write to HS2 to demand that they come up with a design which would allow the road to remain as is. This is something we can all do if we feel so minded.

Have you seen the latest HS2 maps? If not then please Google **HS2 Phase 2b WDES volume 2 map book: Birchmoor to Austrey** and select the option beginning with the link "https://www.gov.uk". You will see the latest maps pertaining to Austrey and surrounding areas. Pages 32 to 35 are full of surprises. Page 32 shows the permanent closure and re-routing of Newton Lane. Austrey's Local — But Can We Go Live?

In many ways Austrey to has much to be thankful for: a superb rural location, relative affluence, good housing and a regular daytime bus service. However, these advantages come at a price; its size and location are unattractive to event promoters, which restricts the options for entertainment within the village. That's fine for those with the time and cash to go elsewhere but what of the people of middle years who have gravitated to the village and then matured into a less active and often isolated old age? Are they really going to risk the vagaries of the bus service, or taxis on winter nights? Similarly, the teen and pre-teen population are equally disadvantaged and are dependent on mum or dad's taxi.

You might be surprised to discover that the Government (both right and left) are aware of these problems and are willing to fund solutions. The Warwickshire variant is a scheme called "Live & Local" it uses Arts Council funding to subsidise live performance in rural communities; as they say in their blurb "Surprising Shows in Surprising Places". What they offer is a diverse programme of entertainment running through dance and music, to stage and drama and including the occasionally downright bizarre. Moreover, there are hundreds of acts to choose from every year. I have experience of a similar scheme in Nottinghamshire where a village half the size of Austrey was able to offer plays, comedy acts straight from the Edinburgh Fringe and outstanding pop, jazz and folk performers all for less than £10 a ticket.

The Austrey Village Hall Committee see that Live and Local chimes with their charitable mission of providing a facility for use by the whole village and are beginning the process of having the Hall registered as a promoter venue for Live and Local events. If all goes well we should be able to bid for performances once the 2019/20 bidding process starts in March 2019. Our intention is to start small and bring one perhaps two acts to the village in the first year. In order to do so we need your support, please, please look out for our publicity material and support the venture by buying tickets and attending the show - who knows? you might even enjoy it.

As winter approaches, the group has now moved into Shuttington and Alvecote Village Hall for its shoots, which take place at 1.30pm on Saturday afternoons. Although we cannot get our normal long shoots of up to 30 metres, nevertheless the hall is long enough for members to practice and improve.

Performance of members has improved during the summer months as we have introduced a grade system. We need to achieve a satisfactory performance level at 20 metres before being allowed to shoot at 30 metres and then to 40 metres. This is done on an individual basis at members' own time, so there is no pressure, but it has resulted in better focus and thereby better performance levels.

Before being allowed to shoot, would-be archers have to undergo a course of training. This is held on four consecutive Saturdays. Our next course will be held in the New Year.
